A hopeful future for a graduated village

A Story of Transformation

The heart of World Renew's work is to support communities to be resilient and self-reliant. From the moment we begin to work in a new community, we begin our "exit strategy." We plan to support the community to help strengthen their knowledge, skills, and resources in order to manage their development after we leave. When we reach that point, it is with great joy that we can organize a graduation ceremony for a village as a symbolic event to show they are ready to stand on their own. As one village "graduates," we are able to work with a new community.

At the end of 2015, after nine years of working with Chork Porpol village through our local partner CFT, this community was one of several that proved they were ready to take the lead in their own community development.

Even though the ceremony took place during a very busy month of rice harvesting, 43 participants representing local government, NGO, and private sectors joined a graduation ceremony at the local pagoda in Kompong Speu province. For many, this was seen as a final opportunity to meet and say goodbye and thank-you to World Renew and CFT, who supported them over these years.

After a warm welcome, one local representative came forward to express his views on the changes that took place in his community. Before World Renew and CFT came, the villagers felt limited in their ideas due to their poor education, he said. They also lacked an understanding in how to save or manage their earnings.

The lessons they learned over the years were invaluable to the relationships in the community. First, learning how to share



resources together and to save through a common community fund known as the Savings and Loan Group, they discovered how to increase their benefits and work together on common goals. Additionally, they learned to trust in one another; and when any member had concerns, they spoke out and worked to find a solution. They also learned how to organize themselves to talk with the village chief and local authorities on the changes they wanted to make in their community.

Mrs. Yun Kimleng, 46, a community leader, said, "I did not expect that my community could have the fruitful results that I see to-day because we had many challenges to overcome and we were always scared and not comfortable to talk about our problems to anyone. But when we worked together to build our kindergarten, and we found we did not have enough construction materials, the community leaders found the money needed to contribute to supplies with savings generated from rice and cow banks."

Choun Map, 45, another community leader, explained how they built a road in the community by themselves, raising the money

from their savings group, contributions from CFT, and labor contributions from villagers. They plan to build another road together in March 2016 as one of their first development projects after their graduation.

"These roads are really important for our businesses and farms," Choun Map added. Over years of working together on projects, the community has increased in their confidence that development can occur when everyone works toward common goals.

Mrs. Kimleng is filled with hope as she says, "We are committed to taking care

of all the property that CFT left for us and to continue running the activities so as not to lose momentum in our development."
